Young and old come to Rambam Health Care Campus seeking help for their medical problems.

Mohammed Awad is 102 years old. He has led a full and active life but found that his eyesight was limited. Awad was suffering from cataracts, a problem easily solved at Rambam, with the help of Professor Eytan Blumenthal.

Rambam recently began performing pediatric bone marrow transplants. Among the first to benefit from this life-saving treatment were five-year-old Malek Shekh-Ali, from Gaza, and two-year old "L" from Northern Israel. Both girls have had to be treated in special isolated rooms for one month. Please pray for their full recovery!

Israel has five centers for kidney transplants. Rambam

performs the second highest number of kidney transplants in the country. In October of 2014, 6 kidneys were transplanted in 4 patients in 10 days. One man from Haifa, 60years-old, received two kidneys. Uri Badler, 63 and the father of 4, from Tiberias, waited 4 years for a kidney! Two Rambam doctors regularly volunteer with

"Operation Smile". Within 25 years, the organization has helped eradicate all adult incidences of cleft lip and cleft palate in Vietnam.

The two doctors, Dr Omri Amudi, from Rambam's Department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery and Dr Zach Sharony, from its Department of Plastic Surgery, returned from Vietnam in January where they participated with an international delegation sponsored by "Operation Smile".

The delegation performed more than 500 operations

over 10 days on children with cleft palate and lip.

The delegation also received the unexpected help of Mee Huang, Miss Vietnam of 2011, who offered her support. The initiative touched the beauty's heart, and she decided to join them, assisting with translations and encouraging the children and participants.

Helping Others

What does it mean for us at Rambam Health Care Campus to help others in a "Maimonidean" way? Maimonides (also known as the Rambam), the Jewish physician and leader of the entire Jewish community of his time (until 1204), had a clear vision of helping others. He emphasized the relationship of the body to the spirit thusly: the body must be maintained optimally so that it can serve the spirit to fulfill its main goal, which the Rambam described as being to get closer to knowing God. The Rambam was truly a model of selflessness, modestly helping others-not just talking the talk, but walking it every day of his life. His writings include texts well-known to this day. Perhaps his greatest emphasis was on

"tzedakah" which means righteousness, but which is also correctly translated as charity.

We are obligated to be more scrupulous in fulfilling the commandment of charity [that is, righteousness] than any other positive commandment because charity is the sign of a righteous man.

Book 3 (Sefer Zemanim "Times"), Teatise 8 (closing words)

For it is said, "You shall strengthen the stranger and the dweller in your midst and live with him" (Lev. 25:35), that is to say, strengthen him until he needs no longer fall upon the mercy of the community or be in need.

Help——Ezer—עֶּנֶר

The Hebrew word ezer (עֶנֶר) is most frequently translated as "help" or "helping." It has different connotations in the Bible.

For example, in the Psalm 46:1, help is used in the context of God being a stable source of shelter and refuge. "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help (ezrah/חונא) in trouble."

A different aspect, "support," is found in Psalm 54:4, "Behold, God is my helper (ozer/גע"ב,); the Lord is with those who uphold my life."

Ezer is repeatedly seen as a quality of the Divine, as an integral aspect of who God IS. In Psalm 70:5 we read, "But I am poor and needy; make haste to me, O God; you are my help (ezri/γ;γ) and my deliverer; O Lord, do not delay."

Another clear example is found in Psalm 121:1-2: "I will lift up my eyes to the hills. From where does my help (ezri/יָנְרָרִי) come? My help (ezri/יָנְרָר) comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth."

"Help" does not come from God alone, yet His help most certainly can be counted on. Help may well depend on us! A clear example is the partnership seen in Genesis 2:18, "And the Lord God said, 'It is not good that man should be alone; I will make him a helper (ezer/ינֻצֶר) to match him."" Here, "help" implies a sense of closeness and interdependence. Furthermore, we find an affirmation of our need for help——the help that comes from the God who provides for us, and the help of others.

These sources demonstrate how help (ezer) is both a Divine and a human quality and a stable source of support that can be absolutely counted on, while implying partnership between the two entities.

These concepts represent well the Rambam approach to health care—dedicated, professional, assistance that can be relied on. We know we have to work in partnership with our patients in order for them to receive the best care possible, making ezer the best word to describe what we strive to do.

Current Needs

Sometimes, math is just plain hard work. The following equation helps put Rambam's many needs into perspective:

Growing Population + Limited Facilities = Increased Financial Burden

While the overall cost to meet our needs can seem overwhelming, every donation makes an impact and makes you an active participant in the health care extended to our patients at Rambam.

In 2014 we had an amazing response to a special campaign for emergency medical carts in our children's hospital: 138 people from around the world helped us raise \$70,000, enabling the purchase of 15 carts and two additional defibrillators!

A 2015 campaign is underway to fund the salaries of medical clowns—medical team members who help reduce the stress and fear experienced by children before surgery and during treatments.

Equipment is still needed for the Sammy Ofer Fortified Underground Emergency Hospital. In time of war, it will serve as a regional 2,000-bed haven of safety for the sick and injured. The bottom floor has already been set up for infectious disease preparedness!

Yet more equipment is needed for the much needed Joseph Fishman Oncology Center, scheduled to open later this year. It will be the most advanced center of its kind in the region.
