DEAR FRIENDS,

The past year has been extremely challenging for the Jewish people worldwide, perhaps one of the most difficult years in our history. The October 7th attack affected each and every one of us. Once we realized the magnitude of the attack, and the enormity of the threat we confronted, we immediately sprang into action. Hundreds of staff members came to Rambam, some without being called up, and began preparing the Sammy Ofer Fortified Underground Emergency Hospital for any emergency or mass casualty scenario.

I was in awe of the dedication of all sectors of our wonderful staff, physicians, nurses, administrative and support staff. All came together and worked collaboratively on a massive undertaking - preparing our aboveground and underground facilities to treat up to 2,200 patients in a fortified area when needed. The preparations included extensive purchases of medical and general equipment for four additional operating rooms deployed in the Sammy Ofer Fortified Underground Emergency Hospital.

We wanted to share with you a glimpse of the various activities over the past year, among them, the hospital's extensive war preparations, rallies and ceremonies marking war milestones. Rambam's most important asset is our human capital, our employees who faced great hardship over the past months. Many were called up for IDF duty, causing strain not only on their families, but also the hospital community. We salute both the international volunteers and our staff who put their lives on hold to help protect Israel. You will be able to read some of their stories in this issue.

Sadly, the Rambam family were not spared from tragedy: Police Supt. Alexei Shmeklov, who served in the elite YAMAM Unit. Shmeklov, son of Yelena Shmeklov, a nurse in the Department of Surgery; Sgt. First Class Adi Eldor, son of Dr. Liron Eldor, a physician in the Department of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery and the grandson of Professor Yosef ItzkowitzEldor, a pioneer in fertility medicine and stem cell research, who worked at Rambam. Also, Reservist Lieutenant Colonel Netanel Elkouby z"l; Sarit, his widow, works in the Rheumatology Institute; All three fell in battle and our hearts are with the families.

Since the beginning of the war, we have treated hundreds of injured soldiers and civilians from the Northern border and continue to stand at the ready for any occurrence. As a result of the ongoing war, we are already seeing a rise in the number of PTSD patients. These patients, who have given so much to the country, deserve our utmost care. We are expanding the services we offer them through additional, dedicated staff, cutting-edge treatments and plans to open a new facility soon.

We pray for the release of the remaining hostages, we embrace the families of those who have lost their lives, and hope for the speedy and complete recovery of all the injured.

We feel it is imperative to continue with the development of the campus, even in times of crisis. This year we opened two very important services in Joseph Fishman Oncology Center-The Danny and Cathy Rosenkranz Oncology/ Hematology ER and a complementary medicine clinic. Both are transforming the lives of our patients and the treatments we are able to offer them. The opening of these units marks the completion of our Oncology Center, which is now home to all of Rambam's oncology services.

Recently, work began on construction of the Azrieli Foundation Pediatric Rehabilitation Center. This is one of our most vital projects, as currently, there is no local solution for children requiring rehabilitation. On a personal note, my family and I know well the value of pediatric rehabilitation and I am proud that we will be able to offer this important service to the children of Northern Israel.

Development of our campus includes interior construction of three additional floors of the Eyal Ofer Heart Hospital. The third and fifth floors will house the Department of Cardiac Surgery operating rooms and the Cardiac Surgery



Prof. Miki Halberthal speaking at the Memorial Day ceremony Inpatient Department. The fourth floor will be home to the Terri and Barry Volpert Family Cardiac Imaging Center and a Cardiac Rehabilitation Center. Work on these floors is scheduled to be completed in the third quarter of 2024.

Last year we unveiled the Rambam Vision 2065: securing a healthy future for the people of Northern Israel, for many generations to come. The first phase of Rambam's Vision 2065 is the establishment of the North Campus. This three building compound will house various departments and clinics, including:

• The **Center for Neurology and Neurosurgery** will encompass most of Rambam's neurology and neurosurgery departments and services

• The **Center for Brain Health** - will house both clinical and research facilities

• Mother and Child Building - will be home to comprehensive healthcare services tailored specifically for the unique needs of mothers and children

This year, we felt that it was not a time for celebrations, and so we postponed the 2024 Rambam Summit. We hope for more peaceful, calmer times, and that you will be able to join us for the next Rambam Summit.

Finally, on behalf of Rambam and the people of Northern Israel, I would like to personally thank you, our friends from around the world, especially from Israel, USA, Canada, Latin America and the UK, for your kindness and support. It truly warmed our hearts knowing that you were with us during this time of national challenge. We share a common calling—to deliver healthcare solutions and to be ready for every scenario.

PREPARING FOR ANY SCENARIO

pened in 2014, based on lessons learned from the Second Lebanon War, the 2,000-bed Sammy Ofer Fortified Underground Emergency Hospital (FUEH) has become an international model. In peacetime, it is a threelevel underground parking lot, but it transforms into a state-of-the-art fortified emergency hospital during national emergencies or wartime.

During the pandemic, the FUEH allowed us to isolate COVID-19 patients from regular hospital patients, saving tens of hundreds of lives. When the pandemic was over, we breathed a collective sigh of relief, and once again, the FUEH became a parking lot.

We hoped the FUEH would not be needed for a long time, but suddenly, October 7 was upon us, and in coordination with the Ministry of Health and the Israel Defense Forces Home Front Command, we began preparing our underground facility. Rambam's leadership sprang into action. Dedicated staff staff as well as three hundred IDF navy soldiers from the nearby base worked together around the clock to prepare the FUEH. Despite its logistical magnitude, within 36 hours, everything was in place. However, there is more to it than that.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

Readiness also involves training, coordinating, and planning for every scenario, and a program of emergency drills was established.

In a time when medical staff, ambulance drivers, medics, social workers, and hospital support staff must cope with a continuous flow of hundreds of patients,

synchronization is of the essence. Days after the war commenced, an extensive Magen David Adom (MDA) drill mirrored a wartime scenario in which dozens of ambulances would need to access the FUEH safely and seamlessly.

One week later, a drill for receiving outpatients in need of dialysis was conducted. These patients were brought to the designated dialysis area in the FUEH and connected to their life-saving devices for four hours.

Rambam has accumulated vast experience and treated a higher numbers of severely injured patients Since the early days of the war, Rambam staff held essential training sessions and simulations for IDF medical teams. Using medical manikins to simulate scenarios our staff trained military personnel in life-saving interventions, emergencies they might encounter in the field, and mass casualty situations.

MISSILE DRILL

.....

Simulating a direct missile attack on city buildings was the focus of two specialized drills.

A drill in the Green-Wagner Department of Emergency Medicine trained teams to respond to a direct missile attack on a building, coinciding with a missile hitting one of the hospital departments. This precision exercise focused on Rambam receiving the wounded from more than one location simultaneously evacuating the ER to receive large numbers of patients

Just days before Iran's missile attack in April, hospital personnel, the IDF, and MDA practiced admitting and treating 100 wounded residents of an apartment block. They were evacuated, admitted to the ER, and later transferred to other hospital departments for ongoing care.

COMPREHENSIVE SOLUTION FOR HAIFA HOSPITALS

Rambam serves as the designated hospital for the Haifa region. In an emergency, patients from the unfortified Carmel Medical Center and Fliman Geriatric Hospital will be transferred and cared for at Rambam. To ensure a smooth transfer of patients and hospital staff, Rambam trained teams from Carmel and Fliman on patient information systems, triage, surgery, labor and delivery, and more, as well as specialized patient care specific to their institutions.

Drills testing workflow, patient reception, procedures, and functionality are ongoing, yet the positive feedback from the IDF, MDA, and healthcare providers confirms their success. This acknowledgment further substantiates Rambam's international reputation as a leading healthcare center.

FROM MILITARY UNIFORM TO HOSPITAL SCRUBS

RAMBAM'S MEDICAL "SUPERHEROES" FIGHT ON TWO FRONTS

S words of Iron has demanded an all-hands-on-deck effort from all of Israel's citizens, and Rambam's staff members stepped up in many ways. Hundreds were called up for reserve duty, from every hospital sector. None gave it a second thought, and they all proudly reported for duty with the full support of the Rambam administration and other staff members who had to fill in whenever needed.

Of the hundreds, four share their experiences with us.



Dr. Yotam Shkedy, director of the Head and Neck Surgery Unit, divided his time between Rambam and Gaza. He attended to complex cases and performed urgent surgeries at Rambam whenever he could leave his unit in the IDF. He described his frequent transition from civilian doctor to military officer as strange and not an ideal situation; he feels extremely fortunate to be available for both his patients and fellow soldiers.

ER physician **Dr. Mor Kadusi** displayed unwavering dedication to both Rambam and the IDF. Not required for reserve duty, she volunteered within hours of the war's outbreak and served with a combat battalion in northern Gaza. She faced many medical challenges like shrapnel wounds, burns, illness, and infections, but her training and strong bonds with comrades helped her through.



Dr. Joseph Schnapp from the Maxillofacial Rehabilitation Department and Temporomandibular Disorders Unit served at the Shura Camp victim identification center.

Despite his volunteer experience for ZAKA search and rescue as a corpse identification specialist, the complex identification process at Shura involved DNA testing, X-ray interpretation, and other forensic techniques, the relentless flow of corpses and coffins took an emotional toll on him.

Dr. David Nikomarov. director of Musculoskeletal Oncology Surgery in the Orthopedic Surgery Section, specializes in musculoskeletal malignancies. He also continued many Rambam duties while serving in Gaza. Due to his rank and role, he was immediately called up for reserve duty and came to Rambam whenever possible. to perform surgeries and then return to his unit in Gaza. He expressed pride in being able t o serve in the army while treating patients at

Our reservists rarely saw their families, however, they emphasized that the support they received from their families and Rambam colleagues helped them navigate the many difficult moments.

GLOBAL VOLUNTEERS UNITE FOR WAR EFFORTS

Dr. Amnon Berger, an obstetric anesthesiologist from Boston, knew he had to contribute his experience. He explained, "I couldn't just stand by—I volunteered through the IL-USDocAid initiative, packed my bags, and within days, reported to Rambam." Before returning to Boston, he praised the hospital's response to the urgent medical needs of the injured.



Swedish born Dr. Jonathan Herdevall, a physician and ex-Givati Brigade soldier, had planned a vacation in Israel when the attack occurred. "A week before my flight, the attack happened," he recalls. Feeling uneasy for not being involved, he arranged to volunteer. While here. Herdevall felt part of it all and praised everyone for their support and hard work.



Within days, Brazilianborn Dr. Leonardo Gendzel, a pediatric anesthesiologist in North Carolina, applied to volunteer. Reflecting on his time at Rambam, he said, "I did what I've been trained to do, and being here meant my colleagues could have some time off." He treated a seriously wounded mother and her teenage son, stating, "Treating the young boy was like treating my own son. The display of unity at Rambam was evident. I pray for Israel's safety and the hostages' return."

ince October 7, Rambam management and staff have displayed unwavering solidarity, demonstrating a united front and commitment to the national cause.

AN UNBREAKABLE BOND WITH NILI

.

On November 14, dozens of Rambam's nurses gathered to stand in solidarity with their

colleague, Nili Margalit, nurse at Soroka Medical Center who was taken hostage from her home in Kibbutz Nir Oz. At the event, Gila Hyams, director of Nursing, commented, "We all want to see all the hostages brought home – today – safe and sound. We call for their immediate release."

STICKERS, YELLOW RIBBONS, AND FAMILY MEMBERS

On November 23, the families of Ofir Tzarfati (27) and Alon Ohel (22), kidnapped from Nova, participated in a solidarity rally together with hospital employees, patients, and visitors. Everyone placed stickers with the faces of the hostages, yellow ribbons, and messages of support on poster boards.

Fighting tears, Ofir's courageous mother – Rachel, and Shoval Gal, his partner whose life he managed to

save, addressed the crowd and asked Rambam employees to keep fighting for the cause. "We are happy for each one who returns home to their families. We must continue for the women, the men, the fathers, for everyone."

Sadly, just six days later, on November 29, the body of Ofir Tzarfati was located in Gaza and returned to Israel for burial.

BANISHING THE DARKNESS

Rambam staff and special guests gathered for the lighting of the fifth Hanukkah candle. Rachel Tzarfati, mother of Ofir z"l, and Yelena Shmeklov, mother of Police Supt. Alexei Shmeklov z"l—a fallen soldier, participated in the candle-lighting ceremony.

Wishing for the soldiers' safe return, Prof. Halberthal said, "We are determined and steadfast to banish the darkness, fight until the end, and return the light for the State of Israel."

THE PRESIDENT OF THE STATE OF ISRAEL SALUTES RAMBAM

On December 31, the President of Israel, Yitzhak Herzog, and first lady, Michal, visited Rambam and met with staff and wounded soldiers.

During a ceremony, the President expressed his

appreciation to the hospital staff, "On behalf of the nation, I want to express my gratitude. Israel's healthcare system is coping in the face of a challenge never before experienced. You are an anchor for many individuals across the country, but Rambam is the anchor of the North."

100 DAYS LATER

On January 14, hundreds of Rambam employees gathered to mark 100 days since the massacre—part of many nationwide solidarity rallies.

Zohar Koval, a former nurse and a Nova survivor, spoke of her ordeal and thanked her Rambam colleagues for their support.

We all pray for the well-being and safe return of the hostages. We stand in solidarity with their families, our courageous soldiers, those directly impacted, and all of Am Yisrael.

CARING FOR OUR STAFF UNDERGROUND & ABOVEGROUND

THE IMPOSSIBLE MADE POSSIBLE

As war broke out, Rambam understood that the needs of our employees were a priority. The problem: while our staff were working 24/7, the education system was shut down. The solution: an on-campus daycare center for children ages 3-14.

The temporary center was an ideal solution and cared for hundreds of children. It was set up in less than 72 hours with age-appropriate educational and fun activities. However, we needed a long-term solution.

Through the support of the Frieze Family Foundation, a group of volunteers from the School of

Architecture at the Bezalel Academy of Arts & Design in Tel Aviv, the impossible was made possible—a one-of-a-kind underground, fortified children's area in the Sammy Ofer Fortified Underground Emergency Hospital was created.

The challenge: design a soothing environment for the children who cannot be left home alone. The solution: safe from any aboveground threats, a brightly decorated children's area with play and study zones where caregivers and educators keep children occupied while their parents work, and the study area is fully equipped.

From concept to establishment, the teams demonstrated how innovation, architectural and design skills, a limited budget, and a short time frame could solve a significant and urgent problem.

A senior physician and father of

three said, "I can bring my children to a safe place where they can enjoy themselves and check in on them whenever necessary. My mind can be fully dedicated to work when my heart is calm."

EMPLOYEE WELL-BEING

Understanding the need to support its staff, Rambam counselors provide assistance through in-person or Zoom sessions, and employees have access to various social resources to help them cope with war-related anxieties.

"With the right support, we can gather strength," says Liat Ariel, director of Psychological Service, "Connection and human contact are fundamental. National resilience begins with personal resilience—together, we will win."

Yamit prayed that the baby would arrive after midnight, knowing that the 7th would forever be a day of national mourning. At 1:52 a.m. on October 8, the couple's son was born at Rambam and later that day, Zvika arrived to meet his grandson.


CROSSING PATHS IN GAZA

FALLEN WARRIORS

very year, on Memorial Day, Rambam honors the 73 staff, or their family members, who perished in Israel's attacks and conflicts. Sadly, we mourn three more heroes who have passed since the war began.

The late Police Supt. Alexei Shmeklov, who served in the elite YAMAM Unit, son of Yelena Shmeklov, a nurse in the Department of Surgery, fell on October 7 in the battle for the Sderot police station.

Sqt. First Class Adi Eldor (21) of the Maglan Unit fell on February 11, in a battle in Khan Yunis. His father, Dr. Liron Eldor, is a physician in the Department of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery. Adi was also the grandson of former Rambam physician Professor

Yosef Itzkowitz-Eldor, a Rambam Award recipient and a pioneer in fertility medicine and stem cell research in Israel.

Sarit Elkouby from Rambam's Rheumatology Institute lost her husband, Lt. Col. Netanel Elkouby (36), the father of their five young children. Lt. Col. Elkouby, commander of his battalion, bravely served on the frontlines from October 7 until his death four months later.

For 41 years, his late mother, Miriam Elkouby z"l, worked as head nurse in the hospital's recovery department.

These heroes and their families exemplify the spirit of dedication and sacrifice that Rambam holds dear. Their memories will forever be etched in our hearts.



LIFE-SAVING INNOVATIONS

ambam's physician-scientists aim to find practical solutions to real patient needs, and this is saving the lives of wounded soldiers, not only in the hospital setting, but also on the battlefield. By leveraging technological advances, they are finding practical solutions.

BATTLEFIELD INJURIES

Professor Benjamin Medalion, an attending physician in the Department of Cardiac Surgery, Professor Yitzhak Aharon from the Cardiology Institute, and engineer Yaron Shrim have developed a unique bandage for use in the field. During combat, medics must perform multiple firstaid procedures on injuries before dressings are applied. Now, the groundbreaking, easy-to-use bandage containing antiseptic and therapeutic agents reduces the risk of infection and ensures optimal treatment.



LUNG & HEART FAILURE

Dr. Oved Cohen, deputy director of the Department of Cardiac Surgery, together with Vigor Medical Technologies are addressing battlefield chest injuries, which can result in an accumulation of fluid causing the lung and heart to collapse. Rapid drainage within the first hour of injury saves lives. The new cylinder-like device, is equipped with

technology to efficiently penetrate and drain the affected area without endangering vital organs or arteries.



Hypothermia smart patch

KEEPING WARM

Dr. Amit Lehavi, director of the Pediatric Anesthesiology Unit and a military physician, and Noyad-Biomed, are developing a "smart" heat patch that addresses hypothermia—when the body temperature drops below 35°C (95°F). The logistics surrounding the transfer of wounded soldiers from the battlefield to a trauma center can become life-threatening. Hence, preventing and treating hypothermia in the heat of battle saves lives.

Within 15 minutes, the patch Rescue Heat[™] rewarms and maintains the patient's body temperature within a normal range. It is maintained for eight hours without causing burn wounds, a significant improvement over currently available solutions.

A NEW VOICE

Ron, an IDF lieutenant serving in the north, suffered multiple injuries and a shattered jaw caused by an antitank missile. He was admitted to the Department of Critical Care, where he remained with his head and limbs bandaged and his jaw fixed shut; he was unable to speak or write. He had only one uninjured finger, which was insufficient for effective communication.

Rambam and Ezer Mizion, Israel's largest health support organization, contacted Hilma – Tech for Impact, a nonprofit organization Together, they worked on a solution. Using a touch-screen iPad and a new, free app called "Tell Me," Ron began communicating with those around him.

"Tell Me" has changed Ron's life.



HEALING THE INVISIBLE WOUNDS: RAMBAM'S LIFELINE FOR PTSD VICTIMS

or over 40 years, Rambam has been more than just a hospital. It has been a sanctuary, a beacon of hope for IDF veterans and their families, offering solace and healing for those bearing the unseen scars of combat. As the most experienced facility in Israel operating a Ministry of Defense Veterans' Psychiatric Outpatient Clinic, Rambam's role is crucial. Today, 63% of the Clinic's 750 patients suffer from severe, chronic post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), a haunting legacy of their bravery.

Swords of Iron War plunged many more soldiers and law enforcement officers into psychological turmoil. Since October 7, Rambam has opened its doors to 40 new patients, with hundreds more anticipated to seek urgent psychological support. The stakes have never been higher. These heroes, many from Israel's northern regions, carry wounds that – while invisible – are profoundly debilitating.

Rambam's leadership recognizes its critical role in meeting the increased demand, and in response to this overwhelming need, Rambam is tirelessly working to expand and adjust its services.

Clinical psychologist and the director of the Veterans' Outpatient Psychiatric Services at Rambam. Dr. Yael Caspi, captures the essence of the struggle, "PTSD is like a hostile takeover of one's personality. Individuals become trapped in cycles of automatic reactions, leading to a disintegration of self and loss of capacity. Young veterans often suffer chronic stress symptomsheartburn, headaches, cognitive impairments-that make daily tasks daunting. Behavioral issues and a constant state of alertness erode self-esteem and relationships. Our intense intervention involves family from the start, addressing the sudden incapacity of former combat soldiers to handle even simple tasks. Despite



the emotional toll on our team, working and learning new trauma treatments provide strength and hope."

Recognizing that a traditional hospital environment can exacerbate PTSD symptoms, Rambam is in the process of renovating a facility to transform a space outside of the hospital in a warm, welcoming, "nonhospital" setting. The goal is to create a comforting environment where healing can truly begin.

With the addition of new staff, Rambam is expanding its treatment programming with innovative initiatives to enhance the level of care, including one-on-one sessions with mental health professionals and group therapy treatment, outdoor group programming, neurofeedback treatments, and EEG-tracking of brain waves during meditation treatments.

Our commitment to healing extends beyond the hospital's patients. It encompasses the entire Rambam family, ensuring that caregivers are also cared for, enabling them to provide the highest quality of support to those who need it most.

Through all of these efforts, Rambam is not just treating patients; it is restoring lives, mending hearts, and healing the invisible wounds of war. The journey is long and fraught with challenges, but Rambam stands ready as a lifeline for those who have sacrificed so much in defense of Israel.

in medicine, engineering, and innovation is the basis for this continued collaboration



DARE TO DREAM – 85 YEARS OF EXCELLENCE

he three-day 2023 Rambam Summit, incorporating the prestigious Rambam Awards Ceremony, was held from May 30–June 1, 2023. In addition to celebrating the hospital's 85th year, research and innovation were significant focuses of the event, and a groundbreaking master plan, taking the hospital well into the future, was announced.

IMMIT

Rambam's friends from the USA, Canada, the UK, Brazil, Bulgaria, Spain, and Israel, along with hospital leadership, VIP guests, and others, participated in the gala evening. With Israel's population set to reach 15 million by 2048 and Northern Israel's medical needs expanding proportionally, Rambam's master plan for the future was unveiled, including a blueprint to enlarge the campus fivefold. By 2065, when Israel's population is estimated to reach 20 million, 2,600 hospital beds will be needed (up from the current 1,100).

Recognizing the needs of the 21st century, Rambam is leaping forward with research and innovation, integrating the latest technologies and therapies into clinical practice. Prof. Miki Halberthal says, "Rambam will be a beacon of light for healthcare, synthesizing research, innovation, and technology. The latest technologies will allow for the most advanced treatments, emphasizing aging and early disease detection."

Prof. Halberthal highlighted collaborations with esteemed institutions like the Technion, Stanford Medicine, and the University of Haifa, which influence research and innovation and create a solid foundation for advancing healthcare.

At an event at Haifa's National Museum of Science, Technology, and Space, Rambam physician-scientists presented their cutting-edge research and innovation projects.

Dr. Lior Lev-Tov from the Department of Neurosurgery spoke of the advancements in functional neurosurgery and MRI Guided Focused Ultrasound. Dr. Ofrat Beyar-Katz, director of the Cellular Immunotherapy Unit, explained the use of CAR-T Cell Therapy in treating follicular lymphoma. A talk by Dr. Emily Avitan, director of the Department of



Dermatology and a melanoma expert, explained her research and the effects of sun exposure. Dr. Ruth Perets, director of the Oncological Day Care Unit, is focused on understanding the effects of early pathogenesis on the treatment and prevention of ovarian cancer, and her presentation was fascinating.

THE TANNOUS FAMILY

DR. TAL ZAKS

Born in Haifa, Dr. Zaks reached the top of the global pharmaceutical industry when a quest for a cure for cancer led to the successful development of a COVID vaccine.

At Haifa's Reali High School, he studied math, physics, chemistry, and developed an interest in medicine and healthcare, becoming a volunteer in Magen David Adom (MDA). Despite being accepted by the Technion to study medicine, Dr. Zaks – to his family's chagrin – opted first to complete his army service.

These experiences laid the groundwork for what distinguished Dr. Zaks in his future accomplishments: flexibility, insatiable curiosity, and the desire to learn, with a rare and healthy attribute for introspection.

With an MD and a PhD from Ben-Gurion University of the Negev, he was mentored by the late Professor Shraga Sego, and became intrigued by cancer immunology.

The quest for a cancer cure eventually made Dr. Zaks a leader at Moderna Therapeutics where eventually one of the coronavirus vaccines was developed. In so doing, he realized that impacting lives for the betterment of humankind was the most important accomplishment of his career.

In light of all the aforementioned achievements, the Honorary Awards Committee has deemed Dr. Tal Zaks deserving of the 2023 Rambam Award. IL TO DILLA

PROFESSOR EMERITUS MOUSSA YOUDIM

Born in Iran, Prof. Youdim's family name, from the word "knowledge" in Hebrew, would be prophetic. His pursuit of knowledge led him to McGill University Medical School. Later, Youdim worked at the University of London, the University of Cambridge, and the University of Oxford.

In 1977, Professor Youdim immigrated to Israel and established the Pharmacology Department in the Ruth and Bruce Rappaport Faculty of Medicine of the Technion. Youdim's leadership was marked by his passionate pursuit of pharmacological research.

During his nearly fifty years of research, Prof. Youdim elucidated the basic mechanisms of neurodegenerative diseases and helped develop innovative drugs for treating Parkinson's, Alzheimer's, and other neurodegenerative diseases. He holds over 100 drug patents, published more than 900 scientific articles, and edited 45 books.

Professor Youdim, the recipient of multiple international prizes, awards, and honors, was awarded Israel's highest honor: the 2022 Israel Prize. His life's work, leadership, and vision, are an ongoing inspiration, and he has had an unparalleled impact on pharmaceutical innovation and neuropharmacology and its treatment worldwide.

elen Keller's quote, "True friends are never apart, maybe in distance but never in heart," describes Professor Emeritus Yoram Palti and Swedish-born, London-based investor Lennart Perlhagen's profound and unique friendship. Even though they live on different continents, they are connected in every way, including their hearts and souls.

More than two decades ago, Palti explored an idea for an entirely new cancer treatment from his laboratory in the basement of his Haifa apartment.

When the two met in 2000, Perlhagen recognized the genius of the concept and understood the risk was high. He knew that developing a new cancer treatment would be an immense challenge.

The two founded Novocure, whose revolutionary treatment for Glioblastoma – a form of brain cancer, received FDA approval in 2011, and the company became a global concern. In June 2023, Perlhagen and his son, Richard, participated in the cornerstone laying ceremony for The Palti and Perlhagen Center for Research & Innovation in Cardiovascular Medicine in the Eyal Ofer Heart Hospital. Perlhagen, wished to honor Palti's contributions, dedication, and commitment to advancing healthcare. The Center will be an environment for pioneering physicianscientists to conduct basic, translational, and clinical research, ultimately answering some of the most pressing challenges in cardiovascular medicine.

"Working with Yoram is exciting—his ideas are so out of the box," Perlhagen says. "He never gives up."

At the ceremony, Prof. Miki Halberthal spoke of Palti and Perlhagen's unique friendship. Prof. Rafi Beyar, Dr. Esty Golan, Prof. Lior Gepstein, hospital executives, and senior physicians participated. chocardiography is the single most useful imaging test for accurately diagnosing the function of the heart. This technology enables physicians to determine the size of the heart, the strength of heart muscle contraction and the structure and function of the heart valves.
